 Hegel lays out the case for all history evolving through the work of a "World Spirit"
Solon reforms Athens' constitution along democratic lines
 France comes under "Absolutist" King Louis XIV during the second half of this century, bringing French culture to a position of dominance in Europe
 Very Catholic Hapsburg Spain (Charles V and Philip I) rules supreme in Europe based on plundered wealth from Mexico + Peru
German tribes (Visigoths, Vandals, etc.) sweep through a collapsing Roman West
Catholic Habsburgs try to stamp out Protestantism but the Turks divert them from this task
_ Muhammad's Arabs conquer huge portions of Eastern (Byzantine) Rome (+ Persia)
 English Absolutist "wanna-be" George III drives English colonies to rebellion
Rome is supreme in the Mediterranean: Carthage destroyed / Greece defeated
The Thirty Years War between Protestants + Catholics exhausts Europe spiritually
Plato and Aristotle
_ Jewish Revolt against Rome; Jerusalem and the Temple are destroyed, and the Jews banished
 _ Babylonian rabbis refine monotheistic Judaism
_ Americans push westward and overrun the Mexican lands to the West
 Patrick travels to Ireland to help convert Ireland to Nicene Christianity
The division of Charlemagne's lands among his warring grandsons
 Saxon England conquered by French Normans at Hastings
 _ "Humanist" art, architecture, industry, commerce in Italy and Flanders reach levels of ancient Rome
 Socrates
Victoria becomes queen – and symbol of mighty Victorian England
Roman Emperor Justinian attempts to rebuild Roman (Byzantine) civilization in the East
Roman Emperor Constantine accepts Christianity, ending persecution of Christians
 _ The settling of English America: Puritans to New England, aristocratic "wannabes" to Virginia, other religious refugees to the Middle Colonies
Rise of Greek philosophy in Ionia + Southern Italy

Rapid decline of Spanish power after the defeat of the Spanish Armada by the English toward the end of this century
Roman-Carthaginian <i>Punic Wars</i> : Hannibal nearly victorious
Royal families of Europe (Russia, Prussia, Austria, England) mimic Bourbon French royalty
Athens and its allies fight Sparta and its allies in the Peloponnesian Wars
Octavian Augustus (not Julius!) Caesar builds up Imperial Rome
England (Henry VIII and Elizabeth I) and France (Francis I) on the rise politically
Theodosius makes Christianity the only authorized religion for Rome
Alexander the Great conquers from the Nile to the Indus and Hellenistic culture is thus born
England torn by Civil War between Royalists and Puritans
Muslim Arabs are stopped by Frankish general Charles Martel at the Battle of Tours
Black Death and Pope's "Babylonian Captivity" undermining Christianity's moral/political hold – and help end the "Middle Ages"
Normans (Vikings) are Christianized and brought into political-military service for the West
Luther and Calvin develop Protestantism as a separate Christian branch
Napoleon and France are defeated and attempts are made to restore the aristocratic Old Order
Golden Age of Greece / the "Age of Pericles" in Athens / Height of Hellenic (Greek) culture
Muslim Arabs drive Crusaders out of the Middle East at the end of the century but allow new commercial + intellectual relations to continue
Benedict, Pope Gregory, and Celtic missionaries keep Roman Christianity alive in the West
The Age of northern (Gothic) cathedrals and cathedral schools (future universities)
French <i>philosophes</i> (Voltaire, Diderot, Condorcet, etc.) call for a rule in France of Human <i>Reason</i> (or Rousseau: Human <i>Instinct</i> , untainted by traditional social conventions)
Democratic impulses collapse France into a chaotic, bloody "Revolution"
Charlemagne crowned Emperor by Pope in Rome (hope for revived Rome)
The height of the Renaissance
Julius Caesar + Roman army lay the foundations for the military-run Roman Empire
Spain lost to Islam
